


BEDFORDSHIRE WI NEWS JUNE 2024

CHICKEN CURRY FOR YOUR SLOW COOKER

Another slow cooker recipe for you. Hope you enjoy this one. It may seem a lot of ingredients, but once it's in the pot you're done & it is really tasty!

3 chicken breasts, sliced

400ml tin of coconut milk

2 tbsp of curry powder

1 tbsp ground turmeric

1 tsp ginger purée

1 tsp sliced red chilli

1 tsp ground coriander

1/2 tsp Chinese 5 spice

2 tbsp tomato purée

5 garlic cloves crushed or 1tsp lazy garlic

1 Önion chopped



Add all the ingredients, cook on High for 4 hours or Low for six. Add a little cornflour if needed 15 minutes before the end. Enjoy!

We had a very enjoyable morning and deserved our cups of tea at the end of the session.

Caddington had great fun in the kitchen at Heathfield in April on St Georges Day, Chris made her now famously successful bacon rolls. There were cakes and pastries too; thanks to Carol Jones and Kay Palfrey for organizing. Our local AmDram team put on a great drama The Ladykillers. The scenery, lighting and actors were very funny. A lot of work had been put into the props. Well done. Our Speaker for May was Ava from the Bedfordshire Fire Service. She gave an amazingly helpful talk on safety in the home, The many dangers that go unnoticed but could be simply rectified by a Safety visit from the Fire Service was offered to all. There was so much more than this space allows, so other WIs would benefit from booking this speaker! For our meeting in June we will be having a Quiz and the competition will be the prettiest perfume bottle.

On Monday 15th of April between the hail showers, **Caldecote** met to plant a Sweet Chestnut tree. The WI Coronation Tree had been carefully grown and nurtured by Josie from a seed collected from Windsor Great Park. The picture (right) shows Janette, Beryl, Linda and Jenny (committee members) standing in front of the tree, battling the wind. Afterwards members of the WI gathered in a nearby stable to celebrate with prosecco and scones!

In April **Northill & Ickwell** had a wonderful talk from Frances Carlaw (The Pearl Lady) who spoke to us about Pearls & The Art Deco. This is the third time she has visited us, and it is always a joy to listen to her stories about the pearls, and peruse and buy her beautiful pearls and jewellery. We opened the meeting to other local WIs and had guests from Arlesey, Upper Caldecote and Potton. It was truly a very jolly evening.

Wymington & Podington WI were entertained by four members of The Sealed Knot in full costume from the era of The English Civil War. The Sealed Knot is the oldest & largest re-enactment society in Europe. They explained how The Sealed Knot brings history to life by staging events throughout the country all year round, offering a chance to experience at first hand the horrors of a nation at war with itself, as well as providing a glimpse of everyday life in those days. We were shown some of the weapons used and told how dangerous they were, even to the person using them. It was interesting to find out that uniforms for soldiers had been non existent up to The Civil War and flowers or leaves were often fixed onto helmets to show which side you were fighting for. Shoes were also provided as part of the uniform and were made very close to home in Northampton. Finally, we learnt that many of the sayings we use today originated during that era. For instance, 'keeping your (gun) powder dry' – a matter of life and death during battles. Also 'pin money' as pins were used to hold together women's clothes instead of zips and buttons. A good start has been made on our Scrapbook Challenge entry.

At **Ravensden** each event is a chapter in our vibrant community tale. At our April AGM our Chair, Maureen Brewer, whisked us through a whirlwind of memories from the past year. From the gripping tales of Colin Hill, the retired police officer with secrets from unnamed members of the royal family to Delphi Ellis's mesmerising



exploration of dreams and sleep, and who could forget David Hopkins's side-splitting ventriloquist act that brought Elvis back to life! Yes, you heard that right – Elvis graced our humble village hall! Last summer, we transformed a member's garden into a delight of strawberries and Prosecco, whilst others ventured to Ascot with the Sharnbrook Ladies Group. There were lively debates about the merits of hats versus fascinators. And oh, the feasts we shared – from a cosy birthday dinner at The Horse and Jockey to a rollicking Christmas bash in our Village Hall, where laughter echoed like sleigh bells in the winter night. Yet, amidst the revelry, our hearts beat for more than just merriment. We rallied for causes close to our hearts, raising £842.00 at our Macmillan coffee morning and donating 70 kg of provisions to the Bedford Food Bank. And who could forget the 85 handcrafted poppies, lovingly sent to Normandy to honour the heroes of D-Day? But the fund raising didn't end there. At our Christmas Fayre, we raised money to

keep the flames of Ravensden WI burning bright – ensuring captivating speakers, lively gatherings, and the chance to savour a glass (or two!) of wine at all of our meetings. So, as we turned the page to another year, we raised our glasses to friendship, laughter, and the indomitable spirit of Ravensden WI!

Our April meeting at **Dunstable** was a special one, when all the members took over and ran the evening as a 'Thank You' to the committee. We all received a gift and food was supplied by the members. Our speaker was Ann Ledger who spoke about 'Whipsnade Zoo and Park' and how she came to be involved. To start with in 1926, when Sir Peter Chalmers bought the derelict Hall Farm on the Dunstable Downs, he was interested in the conservation of animals which could become lost to all. During World War II things became very difficult and whilst the Land Army helped out, the elephants played their part by helping local farmers. At that time, the famous white lion had to be camouflaged, whilst now there are volunteers who help to clean it up and put on more white chalk each year so it is visible for all on Dunstable Downs.

At **Kempston Rural** our speaker was Robert Brewer, a former police officer with Thames Valley police, who now works as a supporting artist – or film extra as we would know it. He was an entertaining speaker, although we didn't recognise many of the films he talked about.

In May, **Leighton Buzzard Riverside** welcomed Michael Peachey, a well known artist. He showed us some of his excellent portraits including Paul O'Grady and Sid James. He spoke about his work as an art therapist working with Head Start to help patients suffering from head trauma and the difficulty of raising funds to keep his local centre open. The aim of the evening was to do a collaborative painting of a seashore with the members; and some members were very enthusiastic to show off their artistic prowess. He showed us how to create 3D effects using an old t-shirt, etc. The only downside was that he didn't let us keep our masterpiece!!!



On 2nd May, **Houghton Conquest's** speakers were Penny and Peter Berrington with their lovely black Labrador Pyke. They are volunteers for the charity Canine Partners, and told

us that the puppies go to foster people when they are eight weeks old until just over a year. They are socialised and got used to all sorts of different places and occasions. After that time they go to the official trainers who teach them how to open doors, take off gloves and coats and many other things that a person in a wheelchair might need help with. They are then paired up with someone depending on their needs. Penny got Pyke to show us all the things he is able to do, such as picking up a credit card on the floor, giving pegs and clothes out of a washing basket, and many other things. This was a wonderful demonstration and everyone enjoyed the evening.

At **Wilstead**, the fun part of the evening was trying to complete jigsaw puzzles, borrowed from W.I. House. These proved to be extremely difficult and not one table of members managed to finish the puzzle by the end of the evening! Some had completed the edge, others had worked on the middle, but great enjoyment was obviously being had by everyone as nobody wanted to stop for refreshments! The monthly raffle was held, with one prize being a jigsaw puzzle! A coach had taken members and friends on a shopping trip to Springfields where many bargains had been found. Although the weather was a little chilly, it proved to be a most pleasant day out. We are looking forward to our next trip, to be held in June, when we are due to visit Hunstanton. A further trip has been organised, to the Cotswolds, in August. A small group of members have started work on our scrapbook entry.

In April, **Henlow** held their Annual Meeting and enjoyed looking back through photos of the last year with a glass of wine and refreshments. We have done so much! President Alison has been in her position for a year now and our membership has grown significantly, so she spoke to members about her life, including being in the WI and being a florist and college lecturer. She made two table arrangements as she spoke, demonstrating to us how she makes them for our parties. These were then prizes in our raffle later that evening. We also had Sue Pestell visit us from County as part of our official business, and we re – elected our committee members. Unfortunately our monthly walk was called off by rain but some members still managed to make it to the pub for a drink! At the end of the month, 18 members met at our local pub restaurant for an evening meal, and a lovely time was had by all.
