# AN UPDATE ON ORDERING TICKETS FOR EVENTS FROM JANUARY 2025

You may remember we previously set out information regarding how to order tickets for our events, from TicketSource, including advice for members unsure how, or unable to order online. We suggested that a member could ring the Office who would create the online booking by taking the member's card details to give to TicketSource. Unfortunately, we have been advised by NFWI that to do this, we would be acting illegally. Therefore, we now recommend that members telephone TicketSource Box Office direct to order tickets; or they may opt to seek assistance with an online booking from another WI member or friend. If neither of these options are viable, a member can contact the Office for assistance... You'll find a Test Event for you to try out the system halfway down the TicketSource events page.

So, the options for booking tickets from January 2025 are:-

- Book online via the link from our website
- Book online directly with TicketSource (type ticketsource bedfordshire federation in search bar)
- Telephone TicketSource box office to make a booking on 0333 666 3366
- Get help with an online booking from another WI member or friend or relative
- If you still need help, contact the Office for advice

The storms and downpours in September & October were awful. I've never known rain like it. We were badly affected in Shillington. The fields turned into lakes, the roads became rivers and several homes were flooded. Bedfordshire, along with the counties of Cambridgeshire, Northamptonshire and Oxfordshire, was severely impacted by the unprecedented amount of rain that fell in such a short period of time.

The patio outside my kitchen door turned into a pond but, thankfully, the water did not come into the house. Bob the dog got a surprise when he leapt into the darkness and landed in a few inches of water. I did however have to smile when, later that evening, I went into the kitchen to investigate why Bob was so restless and came across a gorgeous little frog. It was climbing out of the water bowl. The dog was not impressed.

Central Beds Council issued frequent flood alerts by email informing everyone about flooding in areas such as Tempsford, Langford and Leighton Buzzard. It was bad.

In 2021, the Government had plans to create a Spatial Framework for growth across the five counties of Beds, Cambridgeshire, Oxfordshire, Northants and Bucks. The plan included the building of one million houses, mainly on our best agricultural land. It was called the Ox-Cam Arc. In 2023 it changed its name to the Oxford-Cambridge Partnership (OCP). Things in this department have been quiet of late but this doesn't mean to say it's gone away; it's just gone underground.

There are plans to build a new town at Tempsford for about 300,000 people. Thousands of houses are going to be built on the very fields that flooded last month. Many more homes are planned for other areas that experienced serious flooding. I'm afraid that developers think that building on fields that turn into lakes isn't a problem.

The question I'd like an answer to is: Why does the Government want to build 1.5 million houses in the next five years when, on Census Day March 2021, there were 1.5 million unoccupied dwellings in England (ons.gov.uk)? What is needed is a deluge of letters from us all to our MPs. Please would you put pen to paper and help stop this madness? *Annie*

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# **CREATIVE ACTIVITIES TEAM**

# RECIPE Bloomer Loaf

# Ingredients

500g / 1lb 2 oz strong white flour, plus extra for kneading 10g /  $\frac{1}{4}$  oz salt

1 x 7g sachet of instant yeast

320ml / 111/2 oz cold or slightly tepid water

40ml / 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> fl. oz olive oil

Extra and flour, for kneading

### Method

- 1. Place the dry ingredients in a bowl, taking care not to have the salt and yeast touching. Add the oil and 240ml / 9 fl oz. of water.
- 2. Using your hands, mix the ingredients together. Gradually add the remaining water (you may not need it all), until all the flour leaves the side of the bowl and you have a soft, rough dough.
- 3. Pour a little oil onto a clean work surface. Sit the dough on the oil and begin to knead. Do this for 5-10 minutes, or until the dough becomes smooth and silky. Once the correct consistency is achieved, place the dough into a clean, oiled bowl. Cover with cling film and leave in a warm place until tripled in size. You may also use a dough hook for this stage.
- 4. Once risen, place the dough onto a floured surface. Knock the dough back by folding it in on itself repeatedly. Do this until all the air is knocked out and the dough is smooth.
- 5. To shape into the bloomer, flatten the dough into a rectangle. With the long side facing you fold each end into the middle then roll like a Swiss roll so that you have a smooth top with a seam along the base. Very gently roll with the heel of your hands.
- 6. Place on a tray lined with parchment paper, cover and leave to prove for 1-2 hours at room temperature, or until doubled in size.
- 7. Lightly spray with water. Make four diagonal slashes using a sharp knife across the top. Add poppy seeds at this stage (if you have any).
- 8. Preheat the oven to 220/425F/Gas 7 and place a baking tray filled with water on the bottom shelf of the oven this will create steam when the loaf is baking. Place the loaf on the middle shelf and bake for 25 minutes. After this time lower the heat to 200C/400F/Gas 6 and bake for a further 10 minutes. Remove from the oven and leave to cool on a wire rack.

At **Cranfield** for our September meeting we enjoyed a Quiz night with teams of 4 competing on rounds varying from History through to Disney. We enjoyed our 'bring and share a plate' refreshments while puzzling over anagrams of film names and a picture quiz about people with 'Charles' in their name. Winners of the quiz were the 'No Chancers' team! It was a very enjoyable and sociable evening.



The Kurling evening arranged at **Westoning** in September was an enormous success. Alison Ross from Canine Partners guided 36 competitive ladies through the event; there certainly was some very accurate stone pushing. The winners and runners-up received some well-earned chocolates as a reward.

In September, **Caldecote** were captivated by a fascinating talk on the life-saving work of Magpas, the emergency rescue service serving Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire. It all began in 1971, when two visionary GPs recognised that having a doctor on-site during emergencies

could make the difference between life and death. What started as a modest effort with doctors driving their own cars and using pagers has evolved into the impressive Magpas service of today operating 24/7, at an annual cost of £6 million, and responding to an average of four urgent calls daily. Remarkably, they treat around 900 patients each year in critical, life-threatening situations.

At **Houghton Conquest's** September meeting, Susan Copperwheat gave an interesting talk about the meaning of Christian names. She had been given the names of all members beforehand and so was able to give us the origins of our names. She also told us the history of some very old and unusual names. Four of us went to Aldeburgh and we enjoyed the day very much, so thank you for organising this.

After **Wilstead's** original speaker had to cancel, we were fortunate to be able to book Jim Coley, a River Warden and he spoke about his 'patch', which covers the river from Bromham Mill to Kempston. We were told about the work he carries out, including taking water samples. He takes four photographs of the river every year to enable comparison of conditions during the period and explained that rivers in towns are often cleaner than in rural areas due to the decline of manufacturing and the related waste matter. Invasive species of vegetation and animals were discussed. As September 16<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup> is 'River Awareness' week, we felt we had enjoyed a very topical speaker.

**Clifton's** September speaker gave a very interesting talk on bee keeping. She also brought jars of various types of honey for us to purchase and other bee related trinkets. We will be held a coffee morning on October 25th to raise funds for our local hospice.

Aspley Guise and Woburn Sands had a thoroughly enjoyable meeting in September when Simon Pestell, head housekeeper of Woburn Abbey, came to talk to us about Duchess Anna Maria, who was instrumental in bringing the practice of afternoon tea to the country. He gave a very informative history about both the Duchess and tea, and explained how, over the years, the practice has grown into the event we all know today. We finished our meeting by having a mini tea party at tables adorned with tablecloths, where each table had its own teapot and its own cake stand filled with delicious homemade cakes. It was great to see everyone lingering and chatting, as we all do whenever we have afternoon tea.

In September **Library Walk** had an excellent talk by Jane Dismore. Jane is an historical writer and she entertained us, without notes, with stories of the lives of 'Royals, Rebels and Aristocrats', their stately homes and the fast lives some of them lived. We had a most enjoyable afternoon meeting.

When **Wootton's** speaker cancelled, a planned games evening was brought forward and 'Spot the Film' and 'Guess the Object' were played with such enthusiasm that after a tea break, the evening concluded with a hilarious game of 'Consequences' which took everyone back to their childhood. Sixteen members enjoyed a trip on the John Bunyan boat, with tea and cake.

**Tilsworth & Stanbridge's** members enjoyed an afternoon at NHS Ascott House, even though the weather made them wonder who had brought a coat! Before enjoying a cream tea in the Cricket Pavilion, members pottered about in the gardens, chatting and admiring the stunning trees and flowers and came across the bench dedicated to Diane Tong. By the end of the afternoon even the sun came out!! And in September we were treated to a presentation on Pioneering Women in Motoring by Debbie Land. What a colourful group of women they were who made many positive developments to the evolution of motoring. It was interesting to hear that in 1865 to speed limited was raised to 20 MPH whereas today the speeds are being lowered to the same!



At **Clapham Belles**, we had a very interesting meeting when Bluebadger Foods, a family run business, joined us to share their love for Korean cuisine and culture. We enjoyed food tasting, including Korean drinks and snacks, and learnt about Korean culture.

We were fortunate enough to be able to hold it in the grounds of Fairfield Bowls Club and the weather couldn't have been better



At **Northill & Ickwell** Adrienne Massey came to demonstrate flower arranging. She gave an interesting talk about using a variety of plants and flowers and different types of vases, whilst she created five different flower arrangements which were all very attractive, and were raffled off to members. A good evening, enjoyed by all.

A member of **Warden Hill** has a close friend whose 56 year old son had a cardiac arrest on the football field. He was saved by CPR being carried out from those around him, and medical intervention (defibrillators, paramedics, air ambulance etc). Our member has a paramedic neighbour and arranged a CPR awareness afternoon for 20 of our ladies. He offered his session for free and another member and husband paid for a venue. Of course, a donation for charity of his choice was made as he refused payment. The session involved some basic information about the difference between a heart attack (where a patient is usually conscious) and a cardiac arrest (where the patient has stopped breathing, and is totally unresponsive). We were all given an opportunity to perform CPR on the dummies , which he had brought along (some costing £8,000). He showed us how fast to do chest compressions (counting aloud 1000, 2000, 3000 is a good rhythm and he explained why – I am not explaining as I am not qualified to do so, but I do understand). We also learnt that doing breaths (even through a handkerchief or tea towel, as a barrier over the patient's mouth), as well as compressions, gives a better chance of patient survival. Our group of ladies were very active in the practical part of the session and it was very clear, that it was an extremely rewarding learning experience for all of us. We would highly recommend other groups find out how they can run a session like we did. Chances of ever having to carry out CPR might be slim, and we may not feel overly confident to do it, but we all agreed, we would know what to do and as Robert told us, better to do something than nothing at all.
